# The Chaplain's Corner

## Praising God

God inhabits the praises of his people. Enter his courts with praise. (Ps100)

In prayer we come into God's presence. Coming into the presence of God changes us. We experience God's power, beauty and love. Praise is an important part of prayer. Through praise we go beyond the limits of our humanity and enter into the presence of God, into a spiritual realm. Praise of God along with worship is the goal of our prayer. We seek to be united with God and to worship him. We move from centering on ourselves and we focus on God and his goodness.

After thanking God for His many blessings, praise opens us up to God's presence. In praise we say good things about God, we tell Him how great and good He is. We give glory to God. We become aware of who God is and marvel at His glory, and we come to experience God in an intimate way. In praising God we enter into a spiritual dimension where our spiritual nature is awakened as we experience the glory of God. Praise brings us into the presence of God.

Father John Capuci in his book, *Opening the Gates of Praise*, talks about reasons to praise God.

1. Because God wants us to praise Him.

He wants us to acknowledge His gifts of generosity and love, and opening ourselves to God in praise allows the Holy Spirit to empower us with the gifts we need to lead a life pleasing to God. 2. Because praise is an unselfish prayer to God.

> We are not seeking or asking anything when we praise God. Praise comes from a heart that is unselfish and open and in which God reigns.

3. Because praise breaks down the walls that are barriers to God's grace.

Walls of arrogance, low self-esteem, and self hatred begin to break down when we praise God. God heals us and releases the power of the Spirit in our lives. We come to know God in a powerful way as we receive His power and grace.

4. Because praise creates a spirit of joy.

We become aware of God's presence, and we respond to Paul's call to "Rejoice in the Lord always, again I say rejoice" (Phil 4:4).

5. Because praise makes us more thankful to Jesus.

We become aware of Jesus' goodness and realize there are many reasons to be thankful to a generous and loving God.

6. Because praise opens us up to the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

The gifts of courage, counsel, wisdom, service, hospitality, mercy, giving, ....



We can begin praising God by creating a *String of Praises.* Here are some examples:

- Praise God for being God: Praise you all powerful God, I praise you for the gift of your love in my life, for you are the Alpha and the Omega – the beginning and the end, I praise you for your presence in the Eucharist, praise you Christ the High Priest.
- 2. Praise God for your history: Praise you for the gift of faith, for my parents that passed that faith to me, praise you for my family and the love we show to each other, praise you for the gift of life, praise you for eyes that see and ears that hear.
- 3. Praise God for your present life. Praise you for making yourself known to me, praise you for the anointing of your Spirit, praise you for the experience of your love, praise you for allowing us to share your love with others.
- 4. Praise God for what he is doing in you right now. Praise you for healing my headache, praise you for being with me in a difficult job situation, praise you for the new insight you have provided me about my faith, praise you for healing my self-image.

By memorizing and stringing these and other praises together, we can praise God outloud during our prayer time, and we will experience God's presence and power in our lives in a new way.
