# Christmas Tree Sales 2008

We keep doing it! In spite of questions about the economy and uncertainty about whether customers would be as ready to spend on trees, our tree sale this year has been a great success.

The success of this sale is directly linked to the cheerful and spirited work of our brother knights who work the shifts and sell the trees.

Contrasted with our meetings attended by 30-40 knights, over 240 knights turned out to work the Christmas Tree Sales. Great work! Our success is made possible by the effort and enthusiasm of all our brother knights that came out and sold trees.

Our 2008 sales were simply great. We ordered 810 trees. In view of the uncertain economic times, a decision was made to keep our pricing the same as last year in the face of higher wholesale prices, freight and operational expenses. Going into the sale we were hoping to clear \$20,000 at the end of our sale.

We sold 804 trees grossing over \$55,000 and netting over \$23,000. We only had six trees left. A truly impressive result. This is even more impressive when you compare what was left on the commercial lots: They had about 1/3 of their inventories left at the end of sales.



A special thanks to all of our brother knights that worked so hard to make sure that our sale is a success.

I want to especially thank those knights who volunteered to take extra shifts, as well as those who manned their shifts on those slow frustrating nights; by manning these shifts we continue to build a lasting relationship with our loyal customers.

# The Chaplain's Corner

THE LITTLE WAY OF SPIRITUAL CHILDHOOD

"Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. (Matthew 18:3)



Saint Teresa of the Child Jesus was a cloistered nun in the Carmelite monastery of Lisieux, France. She died at a young age. Toward the end of her life, she said to her sister, also a Carmelite nun, "I feel my Mission is soon to begin, my Mission to teach souls my little way .... The Way of Spiritual Childhood, the way of trust and absolute self-surrender."

As soon as she died her tomb became the scene of numerous miracles. After her autobiography was published, many miracles were reported around the world in response to the prayers of the faithful. Pope Pius XI was quoted as saying that Saint Teresa became "a prodigy of miracles." It was as if God was bringing attention to Saint Teresa saying: "Listen to her teaching on the little way of spiritual childhood, the way of trust and absolute self-surrender." Within 28 years after her death, Saint Teresa was canonized a saint.

In the human family, the relationship between a mother and child is based on love. The child is brought into being by the mother and is supported by the mothers love every day of the child's life. The thing that the mother wants most of all is the love of her child. Her heart is left empty if it does not have this love. Similarly, the thing the child wants most is the mother's love. Without the mother's love, the child feels restless and lost. The only gift that the child wants is the love of the mother, and in its littleness, the only thing the child can give is its love.

Similarly in the supernatural life, God, our Heavenly Father, created us out of His love for us. The one thing that God wants from us is our love. Each moment of our lives, we, God's children, are supported by the love of the Father. Our hearts feel empty and restless without the love of God. We are made to walk in and be supported by the love of

God. In return, in our littleness, all we can give God is our love. Our actions are valuable in the eyes of God only as an expression of our love for Him. This love that exists between us and God is the foundation of Saint Teresa's Little Way of Spiritual Childhood. The little way starts with love and is sustained by love.

We as God's children get our power to love from God just as a child depends on its mother for its ability to love. The child, as it looks upon his mother does not care whether she is beautiful, rich or intelligent. Seeing and experiencing its mother's love, the love for the mother grows in the little child's heart. It is not so much an emotion as the objective experience of that love. Similarly our power to love God stems from the fact that God loves us unconditionally, and He has loved us even before we were conceived in our mother's womb.

Let us love God because God has first loved us. (1 John 4:19)

This is what we must do. The childlike, who walk in Teresa's Little Way, when looking at God, the Father, do not see His grandeur, might, or omnipotence, but only see the overwhelming and unconditional love that God has for them. In our relationship with God, we do not walk in fear, guilt, or insecurity, but rather we live our lives in trust, self-surrender, and confidence that God, our Father, loves us, and will take care of us in this life and eternally in Heaven when we die.



# SAINT MARY OF SORROWS 150TH ANNIVERSARY 1858--2008: RICH PAST, BRIGHT FUTURE

Our rich past originated when two Catholic families, the Hamill's and the Cunningham's, donated a tract of land to the Diocese of Richmond to have a church built and a cemetery consecrated. In 1858 the cornerstone was laid by the bishop, Most Rev. John McGill. Irish immigrants provided the work force that built the church which was dedicated in 1860.

St. Mary's Historic Church is the first Catholic Church in Fairfax County, Virginia. It is registered as a Virginia Historic Landmark and has been added to the National Register of Historic Places. The church has changed little in appearance the past 150 years and Mass continues to be celebrated at this location to this day

During the Civil War the church and its grounds were used as a field hospital to nurse the wounded and dying soldiers from the Second Battle of Manassas and the engagement near Chantilly. Clara Barton, founder of the American Red Cross, was among those who provided care for the wounded.

Because of the extreme cold and lack of natural firewood, the original wood pews were used for firewood during the period of time the wounded were being treated on the church grounds. Official federal historical documentation confirms that the church pews used as firewood were replaced by order of President Grant. Most of the present pews date from that time. It is interesting to note that President Grant often traveled by train, on the same tracks adjacent to the church grounds, to a resort in nearby Clifton

Join us by visiting the Historic Church. In 1980, the Parish Center was built just a few miles from the Historic Church. The Parish Center was established to serve our growing congregation and its numerous ministries and programs.

We promote the sanctity of life. We serve others in a spirit of truth. We proclaim the Gospel. We nourish through education and we commit ourselves to proclaiming and promoting social justice.
