## Christmas Tree Sales: "Simply Great"

We have just completed a very successful tree sale. In spite of having wet weather and the coldest December on record, some snow, a power blackout which not only closed Route 123 but forced us to close for an entire shift and in the face of the uncertain economy tree sales this year have been a great success.

The success of this sale is directly linked to the cheerful and spirited work of our brother knights who work the shifts and sell the trees.

Contrasted with our meetings attended by 30-40 knights, over 240 knights turned out to work the Christmas Tree Sales, Great work!

Our success is made possible by the effort and enthusiasm of all our brother knights that came out and sold trees.

Our 2010 sales were simply great. We ordered 800 trees. We kept our pricing the same as we have for the last five years. Going into the sale we were hoping to clear \$20,000 at the end of our sale. We sold 781 trees grossing over \$53,000 and netting over \$23,000: A truly impressive result.

Although we had about 19 trees left at the end of the sale (a little over 2 percent of inventory), we netted more money than if we sold all trees at full price. There are two reasons for this great result: First, the generous support of our customers who often paid more than our asking price; second, because almost all of our trees were oversized this year many sold at the price of larger-sized trees.

A special thanks to all of our brother knights that worked so hard in the cold and in soggy conditions to make sure that our sale was a success.

I want to especially thank those knights who volunteered to take extra shifts, as well as those who manned their shifts on those slow frustrating nights. By manning these shifts we continue to build a lasting relationship with our loyal customers.

Among those who have made special contributions we wish to thank:

- the set up crew led by Mike Stephens;
- our electrical and lighting man Mike Perri; and
- our off load crew of Boy Scouts and Squires and their parents and brother knights led by Dave Ramos, Dave Sharp, Steve Smith and Russ De Rose. An especially difficult task this year due to the very large sizes of the trees;



Once again, I thank everyone that helped make our sales for 2010 an outstanding success.



## The Chaplain's Corner

#### THE HUMILITY OF JESUS

Do nothing from selfishness or conceit, but in humility count others better than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the



-Philippians 3-11

In his book, Sober Intoxication of the Spirit, Father Raniero Cantalamessa talks about the humility of Jesus. What did Jesus do to be humble? He abased Himself. In His actions He demonstrated what it is to be humble. He descended from His glorious state, emptied himself and took on human form. He became a servant of us all and was obedient to the Father. He abased Himself all His life. He said, "I am among you as one who serves" (Luke 22:27). He did not stop serving us and abasing Himself even to death on the cross. At that time the Father, through the Holy Spirit, brought Him back to life and exalted Him in the highest heavens. This demonstrates Jesus' saying, "He who humbles himself will be exalted" (Luke 14:11).

Humility is not a question of feelings, of putting ourselves down, of feeling bad about ourselves; rather it is a question of action. Humility is having the will to serve, a readiness to abase ourselves, and to serve our sisters and brothers. Our only motive for doing this is love. Love inspires our service to others. Humility is gratuitous. It is self-abasement without calculation or self interest. Nothing is expected in return. No strings are attached.

But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. You will be repaid at the resurrection of the just. (Luke 14:13-14)

Humility is similar to charity. It is similar to what Paul talks about in 1 Corinthians 13 when he says that charity is not boastful or arrogant or rude. This means that charity is humble, and humility is charitable.

For Jesus then humility is to give of ourselves freely, not living only for our(Continued on Page 4.)
